


Population

Population Trends

The Office for National Statistics (ONS) releases mid-year population estimates (MYE) on an annual basis, the latest estimates for 2013 were released on 1 June 2014. Population estimates are based on the 2011 Census population, rolled forward to 30 June 2013, taking into account births, deaths and estimates for migration.

Over the last ten years, 2003 to 2013, the population of North Lincolnshire has increased from 156,200 to 168,760. This represents an additional 12,560 population, an increase of 8.0% since 2003. The regional and national averages have shown more modest increases of 6.2% and 7.9% respectively.

The average age of the population of North Lincolnshire, at 41.2 years, is slightly older than the national average of 39.5 years. The age profile of the population in North Lincolnshire broadly follows the national profile, although there are fewer young adults and more people in their 50s and 60s.





Key Facts

- The resident population of North Lincolnshire increased by 14,597 (9.5%) between 2001 and 2011, significantly more than the increases seen regionally and nationally.
- Latest Mid-Year Estimate figures from the ONS show the population change between 2003 and 2013 was 8.0%.
- Population Estimates 2013 figures show that North Lincolnshire has a larger percentage of people aged 65 and over than regionally and nationally.
- One in every 9 people in North Lincolnshire has a caring responsibility.
- The Black and Minority ethnic (BME) population in North Lincolnshire is much lower than nationally.
- The Other White ethnic group which includes Gypsy or Irish Travellers and migrants from Europe has grown from 0.9% to 3.3% since the last Census.
- More than 53% of the BME communities live in the northern part of Scunthorpe.
- The average household size in North Lincolnshire is 2.3.
- North Lincolnshire's resident population in 2013 was estimated to be 168,760.
- North Lincolnshire has 85,479 (50.7%) females and 83,281 (49.3%) males.
- The number of adults aged 16-64 is 104,952 (62.2%).
- Older people aged 65+ number 32,522 (19.3%).
- There are 31,286 children aged 0-15 (18.5%).
- The population of North Lincolnshire is projected to increase by 9.4% to reach 184,136 by 2037.
- The number of people aged 85+ is projected to increase by 182.2% between 2012 and 2037.
- An ageing population may increase the demand for health and social care services, particularly for older people with complex conditions.
- The number of children aged 0-4 is projected to fall by 10.3% between 2012 and 2037.



Ageing population



- North Lincolnshire not only has an increasing population but also an ageing one. 2013 mid-year population estimates suggest that 19.3% of the North Lincolnshire population was aged 65 and over, higher than regional and national figures. Currently there are 32,522 people aged 65+ resident in North Lincolnshire. This represents a 22.6% increase since 2003.
- The most significant growth in the retirement age population has been amongst the 90 pluses and amongst older men in particular. In the 10 year period between 2003 and 2013, the number of residents aged 85+ grew by more than 46%.
- Much of the growth in the 65+ population has been in our more affluent rural areas, an age group which is projected to increase further over the next 25 years, and at a faster rate than nationally.
- This has contributed to a divergence in makeup of our urban and rural communities with rural areas becoming older, relatively more affluent, and less ethnically diverse, and urban areas becoming younger, relatively less affluent and ethnically more diverse.
- The map shows the net change in the number of people aged 65+ since 2003 by ward. The greatest net loss (indicated in red) has been in our urban areas, whereas the greatest gains have been in our rural areas, (indicated in green). Local health and social care agencies will need to reflect these locality and community differences in their commissioning plans.

Population

Increasing numbers of young people

- Another of the larger increases in population has been in the 0-4 age group with numbers increasing from 8,522 under 5s resident in North Lincolnshire, rising to 10,193 by 2012. However, the figure has decreased slightly to 10,049 in 2013.
- Boys account for 50.7% of the under 5s population in North Lincolnshire whilst girls account for 49.3%. Over the period 2003 to 2013 the 0-4 year population increased by 16.6%, higher than regionally and nationally at 17.4% and 19.1% respectively.
- The North Lincolnshire resident population of 5-19 year olds in 2003 was 30,148, decreasing by 1,075, to 29,073 by 2013. The age group 10-14 saw the biggest change. The figure fell by 13.3%, a decrease in the number of resident population of 1,425. Enrolments in North Lincolnshire state funded primary schools was 11,130 in January 2014, a rise from the 2010 figure of 10,520. The fall in the age group of 10-14 has resulted in a decrease in enrolments in state funded secondary schools from 9,930 in 2010 to 9,130 in January 2014.
- In the short term we should expect a continuing growth in the number of primary school aged children in North Lincolnshire, with the number of adolescents growing more slowly.
- Over half of our total resident population live in North Lincolnshire's market towns and villages, however, this situation is reversed for children 0-4 years, with 56.3% living in the North and South of Scunthorpe.



Population projections 2012-2037

The chart below shows what the population of North Lincolnshire is projected to look like in 2037. North Lincolnshire's population is set to increase by 15,764 people, an increase of 9.4%, to 184,141 by 2037 much lower than the national increase of 16.2%.

Age Profile 2012 and 2037




Population Projections

- According to the ONS 2012 based population projections, the population aged 0-4 is predicted to fall by 10.3% between 2012 and 2037, with a decrease, of 12.4%, in the 3 year old age band.
- North Lincolnshire has an older than average workforce, with 32.5% aged 50-64, compared with 28.8% nationally. By 2037 almost a third (32%) of North Lincolnshire's workforce will be aged 50+, significantly higher than the national average of 28.7%.
- By far the biggest increase is projected to take place in the people of pensionable age, 65+, with a projected increase of 67.7%. In 2037, 28.7% of North Lincolnshire's population is projected to be aged 65 and over.
- The over-85 population is projected to grow significantly with a 182.2% increase over the period. This age group is most likely to require social care, so increases in the size of this older group are likely to have a high impact on the demand for social care services.

Population Projections by People aged 65+ in North Lincolnshire 2012-2037






Census 2011

Ethnicity

- The ethnic makeup of North Lincolnshire has seen some changes since 2001. Of the 167,446 residents 92.3% now class themselves as being of White British/Irish origin, and a further 3.7% are of Other White origin (including Irish and Gypsy/Travellers). The remaining percentage of North Lincolnshire residents are from other ethnic backgrounds.
- The chart opposite shows the changing population of black and minority ethnic groups in North Lincolnshire between 2001 and 2011. Other White ethnic group (including Gypsy or Irish/Traveller ethnic group) have seen the largest percentage increase, from 0.9% Census 2001 to 3.3% Census 2011.
- Compared with other parts of the country the Black and Minority Ethnic (BME) population of North Lincolnshire is relatively small, at 7.3% of the resident population, (including Other White). This compares with 19% nationally.
- More than 53% of the BME communities live in the northern part of Scunthorpe. In some wards, the Other White and BME community represent more than a third of the resident population. The highest concentration is in the Scunthorpe North wards of Town, Crosby and Park, and Frodingham.



Carers

- The 2011 Census showed there are approximately 18,000 people who look after another person in North Lincolnshire. This equates to one in every 9 people in North Lincolnshire, or 11% of the population and is an increase of 13.8% from 15,952 carers in 2001. Of these carers:
 - 61.1% (11,092 individuals) provide up to 19 hours per week
 - 13.1% (23,81 individuals) provide 20 to 49 hours per week
 - 25.8% (4,684 individuals) provide in excess of 50 hours per week

Household composition

- There were approximately 70,684 households in North Lincolnshire at the 2011 Census. Of these 19,420, or 27.5% are one person households. The average household size in North Lincolnshire is 2.3.

Language

- 95.5% of households all residents had English as their main language, compared to 93.4% in Yorkshire and the Humber.
- In 2011, at least 4% of North Lincolnshire households contained at least one adult whose main language was other than English, including 1759 households, (2.5%), where no English is spoken at all. This compares with 4.4% across the country as a whole.
- Currently, over 60 identifiable different languages are spoken across North Lincolnshire, the most common being Polish, Lithuanian, Bengali and Portuguese.
